Sold **1,854,573 million dollars** in material and received **1.8 million dollars in** value of donated material.

20% deconstruction, 38% free pick up 42% drop off

20,265 paid hours of training/work experience for Goodwill clients with disabilities.

Deconstruction @ CJ

Launched in 2004, the operation has averaged 3 crew members and has done predominantly salvage. Material pays for labor. Jobs are residential, schools, and hospitals. Adds unique materials to inventory. Last 5 years: \$1,077,823 of value

Economic Conditions

- City has lost population (600,000 to 330,000 last 50 years)
- Large backlog of condemned housing stock
- City of Pittsburgh is the driver of residential demolition in PGH
- Access to salvage properties before demolition is limited
- City funded demolition is awarded to low bidder
- Landfill is less than \$50/ton
- No ordinances in place to divert useable building materials or require deconstruction

The Program:

Project RE is a 10,000 square foot production facility (wood and welding shop) within Construction Junction in which architecture students within the UDBS work with the reclaimed materials and job skill training programs on community construction projects. We are also exploring partnerships with local makers to create value added product from CJ inventory
