• LiquiDonate is a simple solution for businesses to match and move excess items such as houseware, small appliances, apparel, non-perishable food, to nonprofits. Using their matching algorithm tech solution and the donation as a Service API, LiquiDonate makes it easy to donate items, keep them in use, and out of landfills. We will learn about the two main programs that non-profits and small businesses can benefit from, Magic Matches, and The Circularity Shop. Magic Matches is their tech solution for customer-returned items in like-new condition that nonprofits receive through shipment directly to their organization, free of charge. The Circularity Shop is where conference and event planners, facilities and warehouse managers, and brands and retailers around the country list inventory on their online free marketplace so that registered nonprofits can shop for the goods they need. Learn about their additional services of redistribution of materials, including office supplies, from large conferences.
